

- Related to collection issues


- Trying to building a program for tribal school (garden & more); I am an attorney who works on gathering





### b) Please check the boxes according to your opinion of the following statements: - There was an appropriate amount of time for each presentation






### d) Please check the boxes according to your opinion of the following statements: - There was enough time to connect with other participants






If **NO**, what changes or suggestion would you make?
